

How to connect a plug

The wires in the mains lead are coloured in accordance with the following code:

```
BLUE - "NEUTRAL" ("N")


BROWN - "LIVE" ("L")

GREEN & YELLOW - "EARTH" ("E")
```

- The GREEN & YELLOW wire must be connected to the terminal in the plug which is marked with the letter "E" or by the Earth symbol or coloured GREEN or GREEN & YELLOW.
- The BLUE wire must be connected to the terminal which is marked with the letter "N" or coloured BLACK.
- The BROWN wire must be connected to the terminal which marked with the letter "L" or coloured RED. Before replacing the plug cover, make certain that the cord grip is clamped over the sheath of the lead not simply over the three wires.

Information for U.K. only

WARNING - THIS APPLIANCE MUST BE EARTHED.



Important:

This apparatus is supplied with an approved moulded 13A plug. To change a fuse in this type of plug proceed as follows:

- 1 Remove fuse cover and fuse.
- **2** Fit new fuse which should be a BS 1362 5A,A.S.T.A. or BSI approved type.
- 3 Refit the fuse cover.

If the fitted plug is not suitable for your socket outlets, it should be cut off and an appropriate 3-pin plug fitted in its place.

If the mains plug contains a fuse, this should have a value of 5A. If a plug without a fuse is used, the fuse at the distribution board should not be greater than 5A.

The severed plug must be destroyed to avoid a possible shock hazard should it be inserted into a 13A socket elsewhere.

Cautions When Setting Up

- Do not place the LCD display near heat sources, such as a heater, exhaust vent, or in direct sunlight.
- Do not cover or block the ventilation holes in the housing.
- Place the LCD display on a stable area. Do not place the LCD display where it may subject to vibration or shock.
- Place the LCD display in a well-ventilated area.
- Do not place the LCD display outdoors.
- To avoid the risk of shock or permanent damage to the set, do not expose the display to dust, rain, water or an excessively moist environment.

Cautions When Using

- · Use only the power cord supplied with the LCD display.
- The power outlet should be installed near the LCD display and be easily accessible.
- If an extension cord is used with the LCD display, ensure that the total current consumption plugged into the power outlet does not exceed the ampere rating.
- Do not allow anything to rest on the power cord. Do not place the LCD display where the power cord may be stepped on.
- If the LCD display will not be used for an indefinite period of time, unplug the power cord from the power outlet.
- To disconnect the power cord, grasp and pull by the plug head.
 Do not tug on the cord; doing so may cause fire or electric shock.
- Do not unplug or touch the power cord with wet hands.
- When turning off the display by detaching the power cord, wait 6 seconds before re-attaching the power cord for normal operation.
- Do not knock or drop the display during operation or transportation.

Cleaning and Maintenance

- To protect your display from possible damage, do not put excessive pressure on the LCD panel. When moving your display, grasp the frame to lift; do not lift the display by placing your hand or fingers on the LCD panel.
- Unplug the display if you need to clean it with a slightly damp cloth. The screen may be wiped with a dry cloth when the power is off. However, never use organic solvent, such as, alcohol, or ammonia-based liquids to clean your display.
- If your display becomes wet, wipe it with dry cloth as soon as possible.
- If a foreign substance or water gets in your display, turn the power off immediately and disconnect the power cord. Then remove the foreign substance or water, and send the unit to the maintenance center.
- In order to maintain the best performance of your display and ensure a longer lifetime, we strongly recommend using the display in a location that falls within the following temperature and humidity ranges.
 - Temperature: 5°C-40°C (41°F-104°F)
 - Humidity: 20%-80% (non-condensing)


Notice for the LCD Display

- In order to maintain the stable luminous performance, it is recommended to use low brightness setting.
- Due to the lifespan of the lamp, it is normal that the brightness quality of the LCD display may decrease with time.
- When static images are displayed for long periods of time, the image may cause an imprint on the LCD display. This is called image retention or burn-in.
 - To prevent image retention, do any of the following:
 - Set the LCD display to turn off after a few minutes of being idle.
 - Use a screen saver that has moving graphics or a blank white image.
 - Execute the ANTI-BURN-IN function of the LCD display. See "General Settings, ANTI-BURN-IN" section.
 - · Switch desktop backgrounds regularly.
 - Adjust the LCD display to low brightness settings.
 - Turn off the LCD display when the system is not in use.
 - Things to do when the LCD display shows image retention:
 - Turn off the LCD display for extended periods of time. It can be several hours or several days.
 - Use a screen saver and run it for extended periods of time.
 - Use a black and white image and run it for extended periods of time.
- There are millions of micro transistors inside the LCD display. It is normal for a few transistors to be damaged and to produce spots. This is acceptable and is not considered a failure.
- IMPORTANT: Always activate a moving screen saver program when you leave your display unattended. Always activate a periodic screen refresh application if the unit will display unchanging static content. Uninterrupted display of still or static images over an extended period may cause "burn in", also known as "after-imaging" or "ghost imaging", on your screen. This is a well-known phenomenon in LCD panel technology. In most cases, the "burned in" or "after-imaging" or "ghost imaging" will disappear gradually over a period of time after the power has been switched off.
- WARNING: Severe "burn-in" or "after-image" or "ghost image" symptoms will not disappear and cannot be repaired. This is also not covered under the terms of your warranty.

1.1 Package Contents

- No batteries for remote control are included.
- Remote control requires 2x AAA battery.
- For all other regions, apply a power cord that conforms to the AC voltage of the power socket and has been approved by and complies with the safety regulations of the particular country.
- You might like to save the package box and packing material for shipping the display.

1.2 Preparing for the Installation

- Due to the high power consumption, always use the plug exclusively designed for this product. If an extended line is required, please consult your service agent.
- □ The product should be installed on a flat surface to avoid tipping. The distance between the back of the product and the wall should be maintained for proper ventilation. Avoid installing the product in the kitchen, bathroom or any other places with high humidity so as not to shorten the service life of the electronic components.
- □ The product can normally operate only under 5000m in altitude. In installations at altitudes above 3000m, some abnormalities may be experienced.




Warning:

- Do not press too hard on the LCD panel or edge of the frame, as this may cause the device to malfunction.
- During unpacking, make sure to hold the carrying handles to remove the device from its packaging.

1.3 Wall Mounting Installation

To mount this display to a wall, you will have to obtain a standard wall-mounting kit (commercially available). We recommend using a mounting interface that complies with TUV-GS and/or UL1678 standard in North America.

To wall-mount the LCD display, screw the mounting bracket to the VESA holes at the rear of the LCD display.




- Avoid the wall-mounting kit to block the ventilation holes on the back of the display.
- Secure the LCD display on a solid wall strong enough to bear its weight.
- Lay a protective sheet on a table, which was wrapped around the display when it was packaged, beneath the screen surface so as not to scratch the screen face.
- Ensure you have all accessories for mounting this display (wall mount, ceiling mount, etc).
- Follow the instructions that come with the base mounting kit. Failure to follow correct mounting procedures could result in damage to the equipment or injury to the user or installer. Product warranty does not cover damage caused by improper installation.
- For the wall-mounting kit, use M6 mounting screws (having a length 12 mm longer than the thickness of the mounting bracket) and tighten them securely.
- Unit without base weight is 26.6 kg. The equipment and its associated mounting means still remain secure during the test. For use only with UL Listed Wall Mount Bracket with minimum weight/load is 32.3 kg.

This display can be installed in portrait position.


1 Rotate 90 degrees counter-clockwise.





1.5 LCD Display Overview

1.5.1 Control Panel



1 [U/|] Power button

Use this button to turn the display on or to put the display into standby mode.

2 [MUTE] button

Switch the audio mute ON/OFF.

3 [INPUT] button

Choose the input source.

4 [+] button

Increase the adjustment while OSD menu is on, or increase the audio output level while OSD menu is off.

5 [—] button

Decrease the adjustment while OSD menu is on, or decrease the audio output level while OSD menu is off.

6 [▲] button

Move the highlight bar up to adjust the selected item while OSD menu is on.

7 [▼] Hot Key: Audio Source select

- □ Press to select audio source between Analog, DisplayPort, and Digital while OSD menu is on.
- □ When OSD menu is ON, move the highlight bar down to adjust the selected item while OSD menu is on.


8 [MENU] button

Return to previous menu while OSD menu is on, or to activate the OSD menu when OSD menu is off.

Remote control sensor and power status indicator

- □ Receives command signals from the remote control.
- ☐ Indicates the operating status of the display without OPS:

 - Lights red when the display is in standby mode



1.6 Remote Control

1.6.1 General Functions



1 [U] POWER button

Turn the display on or to put the display into standby mode.

2 [PLAY] buttons

No function.

3 [+] SOURCE button

Choose input source. Press [▲] or [▼] button to choose from DisplayPort, DVI-D, HDMI, OPS, or VGA. Press the [OK] button to confirm and exit.

4 [HOME button

Access the OSD menu.

5 E LIST button

No function.

6 [i] [v] [→] [►] NAVIGATION buttons

Navigate through menus and choose items.

7 [OK] button

Confirm an entry or selection.

8 [Ht] ADJUST button

Go to Auto Adjust OSD for VGA only.

9 [IC] MUTE button

Turn the mute function on/off.

10 [—] [—] [—] COLOUR button

Blue: No function.

11 [Number / ID SET / ENTER] button

Press to set the display ID. Refer to User Manual ID Remote Control for more detail.

12 [[1]] FORMAT button

Change aspect ratio.

13 [♣] BACK button

Return to the previous menu page or exit from the previous function.

14 [ii] INFO button

View info about the display.

15 [☐] OPTIONS button


No function.

16 [—] [+] VOLUME button

Adjust volume on internal or external audio sources.

1.6.2 ID Remote Control

You can set the remote control ID when you want to use this remote control on one of several different displays.



To set the remote control ID:

- 1 Press the [ID] button for more than 1 second. The red LED blinks twice.
- Press the [ID SET] button for more than1 second to enter the ID mode. The redLED lights up.

Press the [ID SET] button again will exit the ID mode. The red LED lights off.

- 3 Press the digit numbers [0] ~ [9] to select the display you want to control. For example:
 - □ Display ID #1: press [0], [0], [1]
 - □ Display ID #11: press [0], [1], [1]

The numbers available are from [001] ~ [255].

- □ Not pressing any button within 10 seconds will exit the ID mode.
- If an error pressing of buttons other than the digits occurred, wait 1 second after the red LED lights off and then lights up again, then press the correct digits again.
- Press the [ENTER] button to confirm. The red LED blinks twice and then lights off.

Note:


- Press the [NORMAL] button for more than 1 second. The green LED blinks twice, indicating the remote control returns to normal operation.
- It is necessary to set up the Monitor ID for each display before selecting its ID number.
 Refer to page 48.

1.6.3 Inserting the Batteries in the Remote Control

The remote control is powered by two 1.5V AAA batteries.

To install or replace batteries:

- 1 Press and then slide the cover to open it.
- 2 Align the batteries according to the (+) and (-) indications inside the battery compartment.
- 3 Replace the cover.



1.6.4 Handling the Remote Control


- ☐ Do not subject to strong shock.
- □ Do not allow water or other liquid to splash the remote control. If the remote control gets wet, wipe it dry immediately.
- ☐ Avoid exposure to heat and steam.
- □ Other than to install the batteries, do not open the remote control.

1.6.5 Operating Range of the Remote Control

Point the top of the remote control toward the display's remote control sensor(back side) when pressing a button.

Use the remote control within the range which is shown in the following table.

Caution:

The incorrect use of batteries can result in leaks or bursting. Be sure to follow these instructions:

- Place "AAA" batteries
 matching the (+) and (-) signs
 on each battery to the (+)
 and (-) signs of the battery
 compartment.
- □ Do not mix battery types.
- Do not combine new batteries with used ones. It causes shorter life or leakage of batteries.
- Remove the dead batteries immediately to prevent them from liquid leaking in the battery compartment. Don't touch exposed battery acid, as it can damage your skin.



CHAPTER 2: MAKING CONNECTIONS

2.1 Connecting the Power

- 1 Connect one end of the power cord to the AC IN connector at the rear of the LCD display.
- 2 Connect the other end of the power cord to a power outlet or a power supply.
- 3 Set the Main Power switch to ON.



A Caution:


- Make sure that the LCD display is not connected to the power outlet before making any connections.
 Connecting cables while the power is ON may cause electric shock or personal injury.
- When unplugging the power cord, hold the power cord by the plug head. Never pull by the cord.

2.2 Connecting a Computer

2.2.1 Using VGA Input


Connect one end of a D-sub cable to the VGA IN connector of the LCD display and the other end of a D-sub cable to the VGA OUT (D-Sub) connector of the computer.

For audio input, connect one end of an audio cable to the AUDIO IN connector of the LCD display and the other end of an audio cable to the AUDIO OUT connector of the computer.

- The PC text quality is optimum in HD 1080 mode (1920 x 1080, 60Hz).

6.3 Cleaning

Caution When Using the Display

- Do not bring your hands, face or objects close to the ventilation holes of the display. The top of

 Placing any object near the top of the display could also result in heat related damage to the object

- If the surface becomes dirty, soak a soft, lint-free cloth in a mild detergent solution. Wring the cloth
 to remove excess liquid. Wipe the surface of the display to remove dirt. Then use a dry cloth of the
 same type to dry.
- Do not scratch or hit the surface of the panel with fingers or hard objects of any kind.
- Do not use volatile substances such as insert sprays, solvents and thinners.

Cabinet Cleaning Instructions

- If the cabinet becomes dirty, wipe the cabinet with a soft, dry cloth.
- If the cabinet is extremely dirty, soak a lint-free cloth in a mild detergent solution. Wring the cloth to remove as much moisture as possible. Wipe the cabinet. Use another dry cloth to wipe over until the surface is dry.
- Do not allow any water or detergent to come into contact with the surface of the display. If water or moisture gets inside the unit, operating problems, electrical and shock hazards may result.
- Do not scratch or hit the cabinet with fingers or hard objects of any kind.
- Do not use volatile substances such as insert sprays, solvents and thinners on the cabinet.
- Do not place anything made from rubber or PVC near the cabinet for any extended periods of time.




